

Systems Change & Philanthropy

Also referred to as 'Shifting Systems' or 'Systems Transformation', Systems Change is a phrase used to explain an approach that targets the root causes of social issues instead of directly tackling the issue itself. It aims to alter underlying structures such as policies, mindsets and power dynamics, which enable the system to function in a particular way.

Reform:


Revising structures, rules, and norms to make new types of actions more prevalent
